





World Communion Sunday

World Communion Sunday celebrated the first Sunday in October – is one of the most venerable of "Special Sundays." On this day we celebrate our oneness in Christ, the Prince of Peace, in the midst of the world we are called to serve – a world ever more in need of peacemaking. World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) originated in the Presbyterian Church (USA). In 1936, for the first time, the first Sunday in October was celebrated in Presbyterian churches in the United States and overseas. From the beginning, it was planned so that other denominations could make use of it and, after a few years, the idea spread beyond the Presbyterian Church. The Department of Evangelism of the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) was first associated with World Wide Communion Sunday in 1940 when the department's executive secretary, Jesse Bader, led in its extension to a number of churches throughout the world.

Today, efforts to promote World Communion Sunday are carried out by participating denominations, and several produce materials geared toward this observance.

What I Learned From My Uber Drivers

For six weeks I came to church with total strangers! No, they weren't visitors. Let me explain. For six weeks following surgery I was wearing a sling and was unable to drive. When anyone asked me what was the most difficult thing about shoulder surgery, I answered without hesitation, "Not being able to drive!" Can anyone relate to that? I have empathy for those who have had to give up driving. You lose your independence any you have to rely more on other people. Mine only lasted for six weeks, and my wife was a gracious chauffeur during much of that time. There were also lessons to be learned along the way about being patient, but that's another story.

Back to Uber, it seemed like the only practical way to get to church on a Sunday morning. I had never done that before, but thanks to a technology savvy son, Joshua helped me get the app on my phone and set up an account. Finally, the time came to summon a ride. The first thing I discovered is that there are not many ubers available in my small town early on a Sunday morning. Finally, after about half an hour, a ride was available.

I was always taught not to get in a car with strangers, but there is a first time for everything! But the main thing I want to say about the experience is that it provided an opportunity to get to know someone I had never met before and likely would never meet again. It's amazing how much you can learn about a person in thirty minutes. When they found out that I was a pastor and they were headed to a church, the conversation usually shifted. Sometimes they talked about church — where they attended or why they stopped going. But even if they didn't go to church, they often asked spiritual questions. They talked about their faith, their doubts and beliefs, or their image of God. Some would talk more then others, and at times their limited English made it hard to have a conversation, yet we always found a way. There was a genuine openness on their part to Christianity and spiritual matters. It was a safe opportunity to talk about their faith, family, and their hopes and dreams for the future. At the end of the trip, I always ended by saying, "God bless you. I will be praying for you and your family." Sometimes they responded with the same.

I'm back to driving now, but I will miss my Sunday morning conversations with perfect strangers who were perfectly willing to drive to church. I was reminded of that verse from Hebrews that says, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." (Hebrews 13:2) You never know when a stranger might be an angel in disguise, and sometimes they might even be driving an Uber on their way to church.
